St. Charles' Catholic Primary School: Pupil Premium Impact Report

The 2018/2019 funding allocation includes pupils eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any point in the last six years and is known as the "Ever 6 FSM measure."

Schools are able to use the Pupil Premium flexibly in order to narrow the attainment and achievement gap between these groups of socially disadvantaged children and the population as a whole. To ensure accountability, there is a requirement to publish details of how the funding is being used.

At St. Charles' Catholic Primary School:

- We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all pupils.
- We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of social disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed.

Use of Pupil Premium 2018 – 2019

The Governing Body has decided that this grant should be spent in the following ways:

- School visits, extra-curricular activities, resources to promote reading and to fund other opportunities to boost learning.
- Support of HLTA to support learners with identified gaps in Literacy and Numeracy.
- Support of LSAs to support learners on a 1:1 and/or small group basis to narrow gaps in learning.
- Support with enrichment opportunities for all learners with theatre productions.
- Support with residential visits for Key Stage 2 pupils.
- Support with the cost of whole school initiatives including MyMaths and Reading Plus.
- Support with the promotion of healthy lifestyles.
- Support with transport costs, including the Parish minibus.
- By ensuring that learners who qualify for free school meals have their needs clearly identified and their progress closely monitored throughout their time in school.
