Treat others and the planet as you would wish to be treated.




SEPTEMBER Imagination:

When everyone has the same opportunities, power, rights, resources, and freedoms.

Why is it important?

Working to improve equality means ensuring everyone is valued and respected the same amount, despite our differences. Increasing equality is essential to solving many global issues such as reducing poverty, racism, conflict, exploitation, and increasing fair leadership.

Why is it important?

Increasing access to faster and cheaper internet and transport means humans are more globally connected than ever before. As a result, our actions often impact people we have not met, or places we have not been, in ways we do not realise. Learning about our connections helps us ensure our actions impact others positively.

	Fact: HIV is a virus that can attack the immune system. Challenge: increasing awareness is one of the most effective ways to prevent HIV and reduce stigma. Learn the facts and make an HIV awareness-raising poster.

Being generous, helpful, or thinking of other's feelings.

Why is it important?

Kindness is one of the most powerful ways to improve the lives of others, and ourselves. It is infectious, if you are kind to someone, they are more likely to act kindly. One kind act can therefore start a kindness chain, reaching many people. Anyone can start a kindness chain, and science shows it makes you feel good too!



MARCH Gratitude:

Being thankful for or appreciating something.

Why is it important?

Thinking about what we are grateful for helps us to stay positive and to remember which things are the most important to us. Taking time to appreciate the things which are good in our lives also helps us remember why it is important to protect and nurture these things, through what we say and do, so they can be enjoyed by others.



APRIL Working together:

Two or more people sharing the work needed to achieve a goal.

Why is it important?

Everyone has different skills and ideas, so we can achieve much more by working together. Whether you are playing football, tidying the classroom, or campaign for change, working together is far more effective. We must work together on a global scale to solve global issues.



MAY Open-minded:

Valuing and welcoming people and opinions that are different from those you are used to.

Why is it important?

There is an incredible variety of cultures, beliefs, and practices around the world. Being open-minded prevents these differences creating conflicts. Instead, it allows us to appreciate differences as a beautiful and fascinating part of life.



JUNE Courage:

Strength to face sadness, fear, or pain, to do what you can to create a better world.

Why is it important?

Learning about complex and tragic global issues can leave you feeling overwhelmed. It takes courage to stand up for what you believe is right, even when you experience sadness or fear, and to use the tools you have to help give a voice to those who are suffering.



JULY Curious:

Interest in understanding and exploring many things.

Why is it important?

Simplifying complex global issues can cause misunderstandings which prevent people effectively addressing them. To avoid such misunderstandings, we must be curious about global issues. We should question information sources, search for different perspectives, and like detectives, trace the root causes of global issues.
